t Hildegard House, we often say that we are caring for our neighbors. Not only are we heeding the Golden Rule, but our residents are individuals from this community. A recent resident lived just two doors down from one of our Compassionate Companions. Several other Compassionate Companions

recognized Victoria from her trips along Bardstown Road.

Victoria was familiar with Hildegard House when she arrived in May. She has visited a friend of hers who lived here. Victoria frequently expressed her gratitude for her big room at the front of the Motherhouse, overlooking Adams Street and our courtyard garden. She loved flowers. Watching the world pass by outside was how she spent much of her time.

Because of things she had encountered in an unsafe living arrangement, Victoria made it clear



she didn't want anyone to know she was living at Hildegard House. In the two months Victoria lived here, she never had a visitor. Victoria was widowed, with no children. She often talked fondly of her family, but always the distant past. She loved to reminisce about picking vegetables in the family garden and pets she had while growing up.

Typically, when a resident is in their final days, we'll call their next of kin to inform them that their loved one's condition has changed and to encourage one last visit. Victoria had no one. We were her family.

Compassionate Companions took turns sitting bedside vigil with Victoria. A Compassionate Companion was with Victoria when she exhaled her last breath. Because Victoria had no one who was her "person," there was no one to write her obituary. At Hildegard House we believe every person's life is sacred, and everyone deserves a death with dignity. We also believe that everyone deserves to be remembered. Obituaries are written to remember those we have loved, and we certainly loved Victoria.

Victoria A. Wood (Leslie), born on December 28, 1953, died peacefully on July 22, 2024, at Hildegard House surrounded by her chosen family, the Compassionate Companions and Staff of Hildegard House. Victoria attended Angela Merici High School, graduating in 1971. She worked in secretarial and accounting jobs. She enjoyed the vibrancy of The Highlands – the places and especially the people. She frequently visited the library at Mid-City Mall. Victoria adored animals and was delighted with Dudley and Dash, pet therapy dogs who spent time with her at Hildegard House. Victoria loved talking about her childhood growing up in Louisville's South End.

She is preceded in death by a husband. Left to cherish her memory are the Staff and Compassionate Companions of Hildegard House. Victoria's lasting legacy was bequeathing her body to the University of Louisville School of Medicine. **Photo credit: Matt Johnson, The Voice Tribune**

One of our residents, Mike, tested positive for COVID. To prevent further spread at Hildegard House, he was sent to Baptist Palliative Care, where Dr. Chuck Anderson cared for him. (Dr. Anderson is the Medical Director for Hildegard House, as well as the attending physician for our residents. He is also the Director of Baptist Palliative Care Unit).

Dr. Anderson relayed to me that each day as he checked in, Mike asked, "How many more days? When can I go home?"

HOME.

Hildegard House is his home. The place he feels cared about and safe. And where he wants to spend his last days.

That is what Hildegard House provides - a home and compassionate care. That is what we provide to Mike that he missed! And he wanted to come back home. Because he had no home or loved ones to care for him at the end of his life.

Thank you for helping us provide a home and compassionate care to so many like Mike. We rely on your donations, support and prayers.

Mike is back at home.





Meet a Compassionate Companion

ike Meffert is someone who likes to stay very busy. After he retired from a career in sales at Fruit of the Loom in 2017, he began volunteering for several organizations in Louisville. He heard about Hildegard House from a friend. "At first, I was a little squeamish," he recalls. "I really wasn't sure if I could do it."

He attended compassionate companion orientation in 2018, and seven years later Mike has over 1,000 volunteer hours under his belt. It turns out, he can do everything that's called for and more!





In addition to serving his five hour shift each Friday, Mike maintains the lawns at both houses - and greener, happier grass you have never seen. "I would probably pay you to do that," he jokes, "I enjoy it!"

The bottom line for Mike is that at Hildegard House, he has found a place he belongs. "I'm part of a family," he says. And over the years, he has grown a lot less squeamish.

"When I started I hadn't been around death at all," Mike remembers. "But when it does happen, you realize the body is just a shell. You can put your hand on the body. The spirit is not there. Dying is just like being born. It shouldn't come as a surprise to us anymore."

Hildegard House is a better, more compassionate place because of Mike. He is a blessing to so many!
